The Residential Assistance for Families in Transition Program (RAFT, Line Item 7004-9316) is designed to allow eligible applicants to receive a maximum of \$4,000 in flexible funds to assist with moving costs and/or preventative measures to reduce the chance of homelessness, such as rent/mortgage/utility arrears, first and last month's rent, utility startup costs, other household related expenses, and/or employment-related transportation costs. RAFT was established to provide short-term financial assistance to families with incomes at or below 50 percent of AMI, with at least 50% of the funds dedicated to families with incomes below 30% of area median income (AMI). RAFT is a program of the Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD) that is administered by 10 regional agencies across the Commonwealth. Currently, RAFT only can serve families with children under the age of 21.

What would the amendment do?

- Expand access to RAFT to elders, people with disabilities, unaccompanied youth, and other households without minor children
- Increase RAFT funding to \$18.5 million for FY'17, up from the Senate Ways and Means recommended funding level/ FY'16 funding level of \$12.5 million.
- Ensure that families with children, the population currently served by RAFT, continues to receive at least \$12.5 million in FY'17



What impact would the amendment have?

With \$18.5 million, an estimated 6,346 households — of various sizes and configurations — would be able to receive immediate resources to prevent homelessness, based on the average FY'15 RAFT expenditure of \$2,915/family.

What the amendment says?

Senator Jamie Eldridge moves to amend that the proposed new text be amended, in Section 2, in item 7004-9316, by adding the following: “; provided further, for purposes of this line item, families shall include households of all sizes and configurations, including but not limited to families with children under the age of 21, elders, persons with disabilities, and unaccompanied youth”;and in said item by inserting after the words “otherwise require shelter services under item 7004-0101;” the following: “provided further, an amount not less than the fiscal year 2016 appropriation shall be made available to eligible families with children under the age of 21”; and in said item by striking out the figure “\$12,500,000” and inserting in place thereof the following figure:- “\$18,500,000”.
