Exits (values as of 4/17/2025)

EOHLC provides various resources to support families exiting from EA shelter into long-term stable housing. EA-eligible families have access to the HomeBASE program, which provides financial assistance for up to three years to pay for rent and other rehousing costs, and related stabilization casework. EOHLC has provided flexible funding through Strategic Rehousing Initiative (SRI) funds to help EA shelter providers secure units and cover moving costs for families exiting into long-term stable housing. A set of EA families also exited shelter into long-term stable housing with housing subsidies, including mobile and project-based vouchers.

Work Authorizations and Employment (values as of 4/17/25)

- Work Authorization Clinics:** In partnership with the Department of Homeland Security and multiple Massachusetts state agencies, the Administration successfully ran two weeks of work authorization clinics for migrants staying in emergency family shelter (November 13-17 and November 27-30). In total, the work authorization clinics supported 2,910 individuals, completed 1,951 biometrics with USCIS, vaccinated 1,031 adults and children, and facilitated 734 visits to MassHire stations.
